After the dismissal, all are asked to depart in silence. The bell is rung 33 times at the conclusion of the service to indicate the number of years Christ spent on the earth among us.

Old Testament Lesson: Isaiah 52:13-53:12

<sup>13</sup>See, my servant shall prosper; he shall be exalted and lifted up, and shall be very high. <sup>14</sup>Just as there were many who were astonished at him—so marred was his appearance, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of mortals—<sup>15</sup>so he shall startle many nations; kings shall shut their mouths because of him; for that which had not been told them they shall see, and that which they had not heard they shall contemplate.

<sup>1</sup>Who has believed what we have heard? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? <sup>2</sup>For he grew up before him like a young plant,

He answered him, "You say so." <sup>3</sup>Then the chief priests accused him of many things. <sup>4</sup>Pilate asked him again, "Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you." <sup>5</sup>But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

#### The Solemn Reproaches of the Cross

The Solemn Reproaches of the Cross have their origin in the Jerusalem Church where on Good Friday a piece of the original cross would be venerated by the congregation in what is now the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. In this ancient liturgy from the Jerusalem Church the cross is given voice to call the people of God to recognize their sinfulness.

As a large wooden cross is brought in from the back of the church, the following hymn is sung, repeating the verses until the cross is placed in the chancel area. The congregation is asked to stand, as able, during the singing of the hymn.
